Corks same as class 86. Beers and cider must be in a maximum of 1 pint plain brown or green bottles, labelled, with screw stoppers, crown or plastic closures.

Class 89 – should be in clear bottle, any size.

- 3. No exhibitor may enter more than one exhibit in each Class, except Photography Classes 83, 84 and 85. Persons sharing in the cultivation of, and exhibiting from the same garden and/or allotment may only enter one exhibit in any one of classes 1-55.
- 4. Vases are provided, and must be used for Classes 22, 28-48.

 PREPARATION AREA BEFORE PLACING IT ON THE

 SHOW BENCH. In the interests of the environment the

 Committee prohibits the use of floral foam (eg Oasis).
- 5. No exhibitor may move or interfere with any exhibit not their own.
- 6. The Committee reserves the right to visit entrants' gardens before, on, or after the Show in cases of dispute or protest.
- 7. Entry Forms with appropriate fees to be sent to the Secretary or any Committee Member by 10.00pm on the Wednesday preceding the Show (see page 19 for LATE ENTRY information).
- 8. Exhibits marked 'A' will be regarded as a gift to the Village Show and will be auctioned to defray expenses.
- 9. Staging shall be done from 8.00am and completed by 10.15am on the day of the Show. Please name Cultivars, if possible, to enhance general interest in the Show.
- 10. Judging will commence immediately after staging. The public will be excluded whilst judging is in progress.

- 11. The decision of the Judges will be final. The RHS Handbook will be used for Classes 2-55. Other specialist Society rules apply where appropriate.
- 12. Any protest must be made to the Show Secretary before 3.00pm at the Show.
- 13. No entry to be removed until after Prize Giving.
- 14. All Cups and Trophies are to be held for 48 weeks, engraved (at own expense) with name and year only, and then returned in good condition to the Show Secretary or any other Committee Member.
- 15. Prize monies to be collected from the Treasurer between 2.30pm and 4.00pm on the day of the Show.
- 16. Points for Cups etc are awarded as follows: 3 points for 1st, 2 points for 2nd and 1 point for 3rd. In the event of a tie for a Major Award, the exhibitor gaining most 1st prizes will be adjudged the winner.
- 17. The Committee accepts no liability for loss or damage to exhibits or property at the Show.
